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Message from the Chairman

We have started 2024 as we departed 2023: in the fast lane! Our numbers have soared to the current 879 in ICL Graduate Business School, which is 70% higher than the pre-pandemic record of 517, in November 2019. Our Master of Management has overtaken the Graduate Diploma in Teaching ECE as our

largest programme, with 277 students. The GradDip is still huge, and growing, at 270. However, eventually all programmes begin to plateau, as the number of graduates grows to match the number of new arrivals. This is especially likely to be the case shortly, as the couple of years of low numbers graduating will have filtered out.



We have launched two new Master's degrees so far this year: The Master of Business Informatics by Thesis and the Master of Management (Healthcare) have both opened. Healthcare is going to be a very popular major and our curriculum matches the requirements of membership of the Australasian College of Healthcare Service Management (ACHSM). And a Master's by Thesis is particularly attractive to international students as they can work full time while they are studying.

We have several new PG degrees and certificates in the planning stage, in the capable grasp of our newly-appointed Professor Markus Klose. We congratulate Professor Markus on his outstanding work for ICL Graduate Business School over the last four years. Aside from his academic administration and new programme development he has executed the latest ICL Journal, Volume 6, December 2023, and is in the closing stages of Volume 7, Issue 1, which should be appearing shortly.

These are giddy times for ICL. I thank all our wonderful academic, marketing and admin teams for their ongoing commitment and hard work!

This year marks the introduction of more specialized Master's degree pathways. The Master of Management in Healthcare is designed to equip graduates with the necessary skills and competencies to excel in the rapidly growing healthcare and agecare industry in New Zealand. Our Master's degree programmes have seen unprecedented growth, now boasting over 500 students – the highest number in our history. Furthermore, the Graduate Diploma in Teaching (Early Childhood Education) has also achieved its largest-ever enrolment with currently over 260 students.

In response to these significant developments, we are expanding our team of lecturers and thesis supervisors to ensure that our students receive the support and guidance they need to succeed. We extend our heartfelt gratitude to our academic team for their unwavering dedication to providing excellent academic and pastoral support to our students. We are immensely proud of our students' success.

	This presentation is an exploration of reconceptualizing the mentor through the lens of tautua/service in education leadership. The Samoan alagaupu – adage 'o le ala I le pule, o le tautua (the path to leadership is through service. The author asserts that mentoring is an important aspect of leadership. Research about tautua (service) have chronicled traditional understandings of the term (Tivale, 2009, 2013) and recently Filisi (2018) and transnational matai (chief) in their communities (Falanika, 2020; Fetui, 2020). Drawing from Fa'aea and Enari's conceptualization of the three intergenerational spheres of service – tautua ia tautua (serve to serve), tautua ia pule (serve to lead) and pule is tautua (lead to serve)- notes what and how tautua is deemed in a lifecycle, the author contends for this presentation a reconceptualization of the notion of tautua culminates as mentorship. The oscillation of the spheres speaks directly to service – mentoring, positioning one's own individual experiences as mentors and how we negotiate our own journey of tautua within the collective contexts through the 'tautua lifecycle' model – to explore the journey to leadership through service from a Pasifika perspective.

	A miraculous journey	
	Te Whāriki, the early childhood curriculum in Aotearoa, is a bi-cultural document embedded with both Māori and Pākehå ways of being. Te Whāriki aspires mokopuna to be "competent and confident learners and communicators, healthy in mind, body and spirit, secure in their sense of belonging and in the knowledge that they make a valued contribution to society" (Ministry of Education, 2017, p. 5). Hence, spirituality is one of the cornerstones of Te Whāriki.	
	Although spirituality is embedded explicitly within Te Whāriki, studies suggest a need for early childhood professionals to acknowledge and share how spirituality is a part of their everyday practice while serving humanity.	
	This korero is a part of the personal narrative research done by the presenter based on her journey from being an international student in Aotearoa to a lecturer at the prestigious ICL Graduate Business School. This korero is underpinned by real-life experiences of spirituality - magic and miracles, with pieces of evidence.	

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	This kōrero shares a glimpse of spirituality embedded within religious books in different cultures and makes links between religion and spirituality.	
k S A	Given that spirituality is one of the cornerstones of Te Whāriki, this kōrero proposes further research about the perceptions and experiences of spirituality within the early childhood settings in Aotearoa. After all, if we have the courage to go through life with an open heart, magic and miracles abound.
